1.1.	 Welcome GH welcomed members and guests to the eighth Mid North Wind Farm Community Liaison Group (CLG) Meeting. GH gave a special welcome to guests of this evening's meeting, including Louise McIntosh (RDA), Hannah Farrelly (Burra High School student undertaking a research topic on wind farms), Mike Clee, Mike de Vink, Glenn Christie (who will be presenting on seed collection and revegetation), Trevor White (who will be presenting on wind farm planning policy), and Councillor Sue Wurst (Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council). 	
1.2.	Apologies	
	Apologies were noted.	
1.3.	 Agenda and Housekeeping GH outlined today's agenda, which includes: MH's overview of the Waterloo, Waterloo 2 and Stony Gap projects. TW who will be discussing Wind Farm Policy and the Planning System in South Australia. SB who will be providing an update of EnergyAustralia's structure. GC who will be presenting on seed collection and revegetation. GH advised that the next CLG meeting will be held on Thursday 2nd May 2013 and that meeting will remain on Thursday nights and that we have endeavoured to avoid school and public holidays. 	
2.	 Review Minutes of Previous Meeting GH went through the actions of last meeting's minutes. Agenda Item 2 (page 2) – GH will continue to follow up on leads for new members. Agenda Item 5 (page 5) – GH issued meeting schedule for 2013. Other Actions – covered in today's presentations. Members accepted the 6 December 2012 Minutes as a true representation of the meeting. 	
3.	Overview of EA Mid North Wind Farm Projects Update – Michael Head MH thanked everyone for attending and provided an update on Waterloo, Waterloo Stage 2 and Stony Gap Wind Farm projects. 3.1 Waterloo Wind Farm Update MH advised the members that the months between meetings (December, January and February) have not been particularly windy. The South Australian EPA recently released a report regarding wind farms and infrasound levels monitored at two wind farm locations compared to normally occurring infrasound in urban and rural environments. The conclusion of the EPA report was:	
	 "This study concludes that the level of infrasound at houses near the wind turbines assessed is no greater than that experienced in other urban and rural environments, and that the contribution of wind turbines to the measured infrasound levels is insignificant in comparison with the background level of infrasound in the environment". Building upon the recently released report the EPA will seek to monitor Infrasound levels around Waterloo area during April and May 2013. The EPA is a key stakeholder in the project and EA will cooperate fully with the EPA. Monitoring will record both infrasound (0-20Hz) and low frequency noise (20 - 200Hz) 	



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		but it is understood the focus will be on infrasound.	
	•	Empty/vacant homes will be monitored and noise diaries will be offered to the local	
		community by EPA SA.	
	•	This monitoring does not affect current EnergyAustralia's Development Applications	
		which will be assessed under the current EPA Wind Farm Noise Guidelines.

	•	EnergyAustralia has no reason to believe the results from Waterloo Wind Farm will be any different to those observed in the report provided.

	•	EnergyAustralia remain committed to pursuing a positive outcome for this project.

		 A member questioned what the mobile reception was like at Waterloo? 	
		 MH stated that EA has constructed a repeater and therefore 	
		there is a very good signal.	
	•	Sponsorship Activities.	
		 EA organised Swimming Australia to visit Clare Pool to run training clinics. 	
		 EA provided support to Saddleworth Christmas Street Festival. 	
		 EA will be sponsoring the Clare Races at Easter (Saturday 30 March 2013). 	
	•	SB added that the EPA monitoring will go for a 2 month period and will require	
		turbines to be shut down on occasion. The monitoring is a worthwhile undertaking	
		and EA will co-operate by shutting down the turbines to enable background levels to	
		be taken.	
	•	AA questioned whether the vacant houses are identified in confidence (for the EPA	



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	 study)? MH confirmed that the identity of the houses will be confidential. MH added that the EPA study is a scientific study, which requires EA to shut down turbines for a specified time period (the EPA will determine the timing of the shutdowns) and that EA needs to put confidence in the EPA. 	
4.	 Update on EnergyAustralia's Structure – Steve Brown SB thanked everyone for attending and provided an update of EnergyAustralia's organisational structure. SB advised that Mike Clee (formerly Manager of Hallett operations) has now been appointed South Australian Operations Manager. MC lives in Peterborough, and in his new role he will become more involved in the Waterloo and Stony Gap projects. Michael Head remains Project Development Manager, Business Development, OHS&E (Cathedral Rocks and Waterloo). Mike de Vink will be appointed as Project Manager for Stony Gap Wind Farm if it goes ahead. SB will remain involved and will be undertaking safe access audits every few months. EA believe the new structure will be better for SA operations. 	
5.	Moving from Talking to Taking Action – Register of Suggestions and Initiatives - All GH brought attention to the handout provided to CLG members and explained that the table was a register of suggestions and initiatives. The register is grouped into four themes: Community Environment Economy Communications The register includes suggestions provided by CLG members and EA's work in this theme, having regard to member suggestions. GH ran through some of the key points in the register. Community (Build community pride and support local community) GH asked members whether anyone remembers seeing or hearing about EnergyAustralia's presence at the Saddleworth Christmas Street Festival. MH added that he received feedback from the community via SMS and that they were all positive (community was quite happy). GH added that good feedback was received from members at the previous CLG meeting and acknowledged the value of supporting local community as well as the wider region. GH raised the Clare Races as an event that EnergyAustralia will be supporting in 2013. MH added that the Clare Races is a meet and greet opportunity for wind farm landholders. Some interest was shown for an organised bike ride through the Waterloo Wind Farm (a bike ride has been previously run at a Wind Farm near Canberra). It was considered a positive idea given its ability to promote the local area and the wind farm, and the support the event would have for tourism in the region. AA agreed with the notion, adding that it is an excellent idea and a great opportunity to get people to see the turbines. DC also agreed. MH indicated that the ability to provide opportunities such as a bike ride is dependent on a number of factors including management of safety, permission of landowners to access their land, and cost.	



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Environment (Benefit the environment) MH indicated that there are opportunities on the Stony Gap project for biodiversity conservation. GH suggested there may, for example, be opportunities to create a biodiversity corridor. Economy (Benefit the local and regional economy) GH highlighted that an internship is one way that EnergyAustralia could assist with training and employment in the region. MH reinforced that James Endean's time at the Waterloo Wind Farm as an undergraduate training position was a valuable exercise. 7.	Seed Collection and Revegetation Project – Glenn Christie	
	GC provided an overview of his role collecting seeds and revegetating areas of	
	Waterloo Wind Farm with native species.	
	GC refers to himself as a "repair worker". CO state of the other and a state of the control of the contro	
	GC stated that there are only approximately 20 "repair workers" in South Australia. CC presented goods to the CLC mambers and said he had collected approximately.	
	GC presented seeds to the CLG members and said he had collected approximately	



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	 1.2 tonnes of seed in the past year, largely collected from road verges, to assist with the revegetation of land around the State. GC stressed the need to grow and collect more seed generally. GC stated that he is putting back perennial natives on land at Waterloo Wind Farm. GC added that perennial are better than annual natives, as annual natives are denser, thus a greater fire risk. AA agreed on the fire risk associated with annual natives. GC's goals for his business are to: Increase biodiversity Decrease fire risk Keep people employed SF questioned what species are being planted at the Waterloo Wind Farm? MH/GC advised that the following species were being planted (but not limited to): Chloris truncata Enneapogon nigricans Austrodanthonia sp. Austrodanthonia sp. Bothriochloa macra Themeda triandra Vittadinia sp SF queried how the biodiversity will be impacted on the Waterloo Wind Farm? MH advised that the net overall environmental benefit will be as good as or better than before the wind farm was established. MH added that native grasses equate to increased biodiversity. MH added that perennial natives also assist hold soil together, reducing the chance of erosion. 	
8.	 Next Meeting and Close GH thanked all for their attendance. A short video, produced by EA, was played. Minutes of this meeting will be distributed to all for review. 2 weeks will be provided for members to review draft minutes and provide any feedback to Georgina House.
